## Assignment #14

**Lesson: Classroom Communication and Meetings** 

Depending on the grade you are teaching, talking about concerns in the classroom may be difficult. To help the conversation flow, there are a few things that can be done to help students talk about concerns or successes they have. Below are a couple ideas to use to help students trust that they can communicate during the class meetings.

## 1. Journals

- a. Students each get a spiral or composition notebook. Assign students to decorate the front of the notebook with magazine photos, words, and stickers that represent them. This will give students a sense of ownership in their writing and will help them write.
- b. Decide on specific days during the week to set aside time for students to write in their journals.
- c. Each time students write, post a topic regarding school to write about. This will give them the opportunity to think about what is going on at school. At the top of each page, students need to write the date. Let them know this is also a way to communicate with you. They may not feel comfortable talking to the whole class about something that may be concerning, so they can take this opportunity to mention them to you in their journal.
- d. Collect half of the journals on a specific day to read through, or if you have time to read all, collect them all. Write back to the students and encourage them to ask questions for you to answer.

- 2. Class meetings
