Lesson Title: Main Idea in Nonfiction Texts



Grade Level: 7 Curriculum Focus: Main Idea + Vocab Lesson Duration: 1 hour

Student Objectives

I can determine the main ideas of a nonfiction text.

I can write an objective summary of a nonfiction article.

I can gain an understanding of new vocabulary terms.

Materials

Chromebook Access to Newsela app Vocab Log Pencil

Procedures

- 1. Inform students that... in the real world, people read the news to better understand the world around them.
- 2. Ask students... what is a topic or current event of interest that you'd like to learn more about today? Be sure to choose an article you are comfortable sharing with a small group.

Discussion Questions

- 1. Analyze... the author's point of view about the subject. How do you know?
- 2. Describe... what the main ideas of your chosen article were to the people at your table.
- 3. Discuss... (in small groups) personal, educational, or real-world connections that can be made to this article. Also, present terms that were added to each person's vocab log.

Assessments

Students will complete two assessments after reading the article. Both are embedded directly into their Newsela account.

- 1) Complete the following writing prompt after reading the article:

 Write a 3-5 sentence objective (factual) summary of the article you just read, which includes at least two of its main ideas.
- 2) Complete the 4-question quiz after reading the article. Refer back to the text before answering each questions. Responses will be automatically recorded.
- 3) Complete five vocabulary log entries (more info below).

Vocabulary

Five self-selected terms

Students will choose five new terms from their chosen article to add to their personal vocaulary log. The log includes: defintion, part of speech, connotation, how it was used in the text, and an original sentence. They will present their new vocab selections to a small group of peers after the lesson.
